Lansing gets a dog park

LANSING, Ill. (October 24, 2017) - Dog lovers throughout Lansing have been requesting a dog park for years, and 2018 will be the year their wishes come true.

At the October 16 Park Board meeting, the Lan-Oak Park District released a preliminary artist's rendering of a proposed dog park that has been in the planning since 2013, which is 35 years in dog years. Work will begin in the spring of 2018.

Sharon Desjardins, Senior Superintendent of Strategy and Operations, specifically requested that Lansing's dog park not be a rectangle. "Every dog park you see is a plain ol' rectangle with corners and straight lines," she said. "I thought we could make ours a little more interesting."

LOCATION: BOCK PARK

In choosing a location, the Park District reviewed the existing park inventory, taking specific factors into consideration. At least an acre of open grass was the basic requirement, with access to water and electricity. Parking would be needed, and Desjardins wanted to balance convenient residential access with consideration for the homes in the area. Bock Park met all those specifications.

The Park District's former administrative office is on the site, so electrical and plumbing connections are in place, and parking is available. "All of this saves taxpayers a lot of money in the development," said Desjardins.

While the park is closer to homes on the east side, the dog park will

be located on the west side of Bock Park with the office building to the south and Chicago Avenue to the west. Eight to ten parallel parking spaces already exist along Chicago Avenue, and additional parking is nearby at the office building. The dog park will also be accessible from the current bike path.

FEATURES AND AMENITIES

Lansing's dog park will consist of two separate areas for large dogs and small

dogs. Both areas will have play amenities such as excavated berms and dog ramps or other agility equipment. Leash posts, water fountains, and park benches are all part of the plan,

Meals On Wheels thrives in Lansing

Nonprofit status helps protect against proposed CDBG budget cuts

LANSING, Ill. (October 2017) - Denise Cox, Coordinator for Communications, feels a sense of gratification when she assists other drivers in making deliveries to the more than 40 Lansing residents who receive hot, nutritious meals from the local Meals on Wheels program. "For me, getting out to help the elderly is just an outlet to

make friends and get back into the community," Cox said.

Cox has worked with the Lansing Meals on Wheels for the last two years. "We deliver meals to the elderly, patients undergoing chemotherapy, or to the homebound who cannot cook for themselves," she said. "They receive meals on Tuesdays and Thursdays, delivered between 10:30 and noon. The meals

Lansing Police Department offers advice for safe holiday celebrations...

LANSING, Ill. (October 2017) - A recent Crime Information Bulletin published by the Lansing Police Department offered the following tips:

- **Lock the doors** - Theft overall tends to rise in the months of November and December. Make sure cars, trucks, and homes are secured.
- **Leave a light on** - Thieves prefer not to approach homes that appear to be occupied. Leave on

outside lights at night. When you leave your house during the day, keep a radio or television on to give the impression that someone is home.

- **Fry carefully** - Appliances like gas grills and deep fryers for cooking turkeys are meant to be used outside. Read the instructions in order to prepare your deep-fried turkey safely.
- **Tend the tree** - If you have a live Christmas tree, make sure it has water every day. Check your

Christmas lights for exposed wires—a live wire on a dry tree is an easy fire.

- **Stay steady** - Be extra careful when installing lights on gutters, soffits, trees, or anywhere else that requires a ladder. Place the ladder on solid, level ground, and have someone hold it steady.
- **Don't advertise** - Setting empty TV and PlayStation boxes outside for garbage pick-up lets people know exactly what you received for Christmas. Break down boxes before disposing of them.
- **Don't advertise, again** - Using social media to share vacation photos in the moment lets people know exactly when you're not

home. Wait until you return before sharing your trip. Ask a trusted friend or neighbor to keep an eye on your house while you're gone and pick up your mail, newspapers, and any door flyers. The Lansing Police Department also offers a vacation watch service—call the non-emergency number for details: 895-7150.

- **Drive safely** - Ever-changing road conditions and heavy traffic can increase travel times, so plan ahead, leave early, and accept reality to avoid frustration.

People do not need to enter the police station or notify the police in any way before making arrangements to meet there. The area is under 24-hour video surveillance, as indicated by the sign.

usually consist of an entrée—such as meatloaf or fish—a vegetable, and dessert. We attach a little written joke that we enclose along with the meals, so they have a funny little story to read.”

“Some seniors don’t see people for a couple of days at a time, so we provide them with larger portions,” says Elaine Siersema, Meals on Wheels Coordinator. Providing home-delivered Meals on Wheels to seniors is also an opportune time for wellness checks.

Siersema says, “The Meals on Wheels program here in Lansing is very important for elderly people. Our social security checks don’t go up much, but everything else does.”

PROPOSED CUTS

In March 2017, Meals on Wheels received national attention when President Donald Trump’s

Administration proposed budget cuts to the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, a federally funded program that partially funds Meals on Wheels

The report reveals that more than 5,000 senior nutrition-based programs in the US receive more than 35% of their funding from CDBG and the Older Americans Act programs. A CNN news report says if the proposed budget cut goes through, many programs nationwide would lose vital funding.

PEOPLE HELPING PEOPLE

However, Cox emphasized that the Lansing Meals on Wheels would not be affected by Washington’s proposed CDBG budget cuts. The Meals on Wheels here in Lansing is a 501(c)3 not-for-profit business funded by donations from the First United Methodist Church. The

more than 20 years ago as a mission headed up by Joan Voll and her husband, who were members of First United Methodist Church.

Cox has been with the Meals on Wheels program for two years. She herself is a senior, and she encourages other senior volunteers to assist in providing support. “A lot of people we have working for us are in their 80s and 90s. I drive sometimes,” she says. Jo Ann Kijewski is another Meals on Wheels volunteer; she serves as a coordinator who assists Siersema in facilitating kitchen assignments such as cooks, bakers, the prep team, and the drivers. Cathy Mann serves as the treasurer on Cox’s team. Cox says there is a desperate need for more volunteers to help with the program, especially dessert coordinators and drivers.

ABOUT MEALS ON WHEELS

Meals on Wheels began in the United Kingdom as a food insecurity program for citizens who had lost their homes due to World War II. The program also fed members of the armed forces during the war. In 1954, Meals on Wheels gained worldwide momentum and made its way to the United States, spreading to Pennsylvania, California, Oregon, Michigan, and other states. In 1974, Meals on Wheels became a government-funded program.

although specific items have not yet been chosen. A six-foot fence will enclose the play area.

A computerized entry will restrict entry to dogs that have been registered with the Park District. In order to register with the Park District, dogs will need to show their license from the Village as well as up-to-date vaccination records.

MAINTENANCE AND UPKEEP

"I wanted to stay as natural as possible," said Desjardins about the landscaping and overall design of the park. The plan incorporates the large locust tree that is already on the site, and additional plantings will be added. But Desjardins also

wants to make sure that ongoing maintenance of the dog park will not become a burden for Michelle Havran, Superintendent of Parks & Maintenance, and the maintenance crews. So, for example, a border of limestone will be added around the perimeter fencing in order to make mowing easier and reduce the need for trimming.

THE PROCESS

Lan-Oak Park District was fortunate in 2013 to have the assistance of the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP) in developing a Park District master plan. As part of that process, Lansing residents were surveyed to determine what

new recreation amenities were needed. A dog park scored high on the list of responses. In 2014 the Park District began researching the acquisition of a dog park for the community.


In 2015, the Village of Lansing began reviewing preliminary plans for Fox Pointe, and those early plans included a dog park. In deference to the Village, the Park District (which is a separate entity with a separate Board) put its dog park research on hold.

As the Fox Pointe

plans developed, the dog park was removed as a feature, so in early 2016 the Park District resumed its research. By March of 2017, the Park District was ready to survey residents about specific dog park attributes—including the fee structure. This survey was posted on the Park District website, www.lanoak-parkdistrict.org, and promoted in various Park District publications. Excitement about the project began to spread.

This past summer, Park District staff studied the results of the online survey and began the final stage of dog park planning. As of this writing, minor adjustments are still being made to the schematics—the maintenance gates will probably be moved, for example, and the exact location of the dog park within Bock Park will be affected by the results of the JULIE dig (Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators).

But Desjardins is ready to begin putting budget numbers to the concept in preparation for opening up the bidding process. The Park District plans to be soliciting bids for the park by January 2018, with construction anticipated for spring 2018.



Specific amenities within the dog park have not yet been selected, but leash posts, exercise ramps, water fountains, benches, shade shelters, and appropriate waste receptacles are all being researched. The goal is for the dog park to be beautiful, enjoyable, and easy to maintain.

Lansing Food Pantry nourishes community

New volunteers and donations welcomed year-round

LANSING, Ill. (October 2017) – For over 35 years, the Lansing Community Food Pantry has been serving residents in need. Every Tuesday morning, volunteers donate their time to assist with grocery carry-outs, stock shelves, fill out paperwork, and do other tasks vital to the pantry's success. Although the pantry is located in the lower level of the Lansing Assembly of God, it is considered separate from the church and is run entirely by the Lansing community.

"I got involved because I wanted to do something to serve my own community," said Karen Adams, co-chairman of the pantry, who has been a volunteer for 17 years.

What makes the Lansing Community Food Pantry so unique is the fact that it is a "full choice" pantry, meaning families in need choose each item they take home, a luxury Adams says very few pantries have. Although many donations come in the form of non-perishable food items, personal care products such as toothpaste, deodorant, or toilet paper are also accepted. Monetary donations are always appreciated, which are used to purchase items that are not frequently donated, such as flour, sugar, and canned meats.

DRIBS AND DRABS

In fact, Adams says that from May until Thanksgiving, the pantry receives very little donations at all. As of this writing, the shelves are "getting low on stock," says volunteer Bob Barnes.

"It just comes in dribs and drabs after the post office food drive. School's out, organizations don't meet," Adams explained.

COMMUNITY GENEROSITY

Despite the dry spell throughout summer, Adams says the pantry has never needed to have a fundraiser, thanks to the generosity of the Lansing community.

"The community is incredibly generous to us. The Greater Chicago Food Depository is blown away by what we do here.... This is a blue-collar community and people have stepped up in an awesome way," Adams said.

With the holidays approaching, the food pantry is planning Thanksgiving dinner donations as well. Folks will have the choice of a Lencioni's-prepared meal, a basket delivered by the Lions Club, or a turkey pick-up during their regular pantry visit day.

SERVING LANSING COMMUNITY

People in need are encouraged to visit the food pantry on Tuesdays

from 11am-1pm. Some paperwork and an interview are required for new guests, but two bags of food will be given to those visiting for the first time.

"We only serve Lansing residents—we try to really see that the donations go to people who are truly in need," Adams said.

Currently, the pantry serves about 120 people and has 35 volunteers, including Janet Peterson and her son Jai, who have both been volunteering with the pantry for over a year.

"It's like family here," Peterson said, summing up their time with the pantry.

WAYS TO HELP

Anyone interested donating, volunteering, or learning more should contact Karen Adams at 708-895-3807. The food pantry welcomes new volunteers and accepts donations year-round.

"We are helping people in a time of need. Maybe they lost their job, maybe they're ill. We certainly can't meet their entire food needs, but we can supplement, and in a pretty good way. That frees up some of the money they do have, so they can pay their electric bills, so they can pay their rent," Adams said. "Plus, it's something that really draws the community together."



LANSING VETERANS MEMORIAL

Honoring Veterans in Lansing and Beyond

LANSING, Ill. (October 2017) - The Lansing Veterans Memorial, located at the Lansing Municipal Airport, at the corner of Burnham Avenue and Glenwood-Lansing Road, will be the site of an annual Veterans Day Service to honor all who have served in the nation's armed forces. The service—Sunday, November 5 at 2:00pm—will include a special remembrance of the 100th anniversary of World War I with a raising of a special WWI commemorative flag. Attendees are encouraged to bring chairs as no seating is available. The event will happen rain or shine. In case of inclement weather, the ceremony will be moved inside the Ford Hangar.

KEEPING PATRIOTISM ALIVE

Ceremonies such as the annual Veteran's Day service traditionally include a presentation of colors, a gun salute, singing of the national anthem, playing of "Taps," a guest speaker, and raising of the American flag, flags of the military branches, and POW/MIA flags.

"As a veteran, I can think of no better way to honor our fallen and missing than to present our nation's colors," said Jeff Schoettle, U.S. Navy Veteran and member of the Lansing Veterans Memorial Ceremonial Honor Guard. "Presenting our flag, along with the POW/MIA flag and the flags of our Armed Services during ceremonies, parades, and

other events helps keep the sense of patriotism alive among our citizens."

"How often do we as citizens," he continued, "get a chance to stand amongst our neighbors and recite the Pledge of Allegiance together? How often do we hear a rifle salute or 'Taps'? The guard takes great pride in keeping these traditions alive while making sure those who have sacrificed for our country are not forgotten."

HELP FROM GARY SINISE

In 2015, actor Gary Sinise made an appearance at the memorial, accompanying a \$15,000 donation from the Gary Sinise Foundation. The donation enabled the Lansing Veterans Memorial Foundation to add a jungle trail that visitors can walk through to get a sense of what it was like in Vietnam.

The connection to Sinise goes back to the very start of the Lansing Veterans Memorial. Long before he was known for his role as Lieutenant Dan Taylor in the hit movie *Forrest Gump*, Sinise directed a play called "Tracers" at the Steppenwolf Theatre. The play was about the Vietnam War, and Lansing resident

Tom Lubberda was in the audience (and then went back to see it a second time). At the theater, Lubberda grabbed a flyer for a veterans group that was just starting up, the Vietnam Veterans of America. Having served with the U.S. Marines in Vietnam in 1966 and 1967,

go? Why don't we build a memorial?"

Soon plans were underway with the help of a group of local Vietnam Veterans, most of them also members of the VVA Chapter 153. Instrumental in the beginning stages were Craig Greenhill, Tom DeBold, Ed Miszak, and Ed Kurzjera. "And if

it weren't for congressman Jack Davis and Mayor Bill Bathis, it couldn't have happened," said Lubberda.

UNSEEN SYMBOLISM

Though many Lansing residents are familiar with the memorial because the large helicopter is so visible from the road-

ways, fewer realize the symbolism enshrined on the other side. Granite walls bear the names of those lost in our nation's conflicts, and a mural etched into the center panel represents the spirits of veterans past and the sacrifices they made. "A lot of people don't even know it's back there," said Lubberda.

"There's a lot of symbolism and meaning to the memorial," he

Lubberda started going to meetings of VVA Chapter 153, which originally met in Blue Island—the town where Sinise was born.

REMEMBERING THE LOST

"The group just jelled and started doing good things and raising money for charities and helping veterans," said Lubberda. "Then at a meeting, I said, 'We're doing good stuff, but what about the guys we lost, and what's going to happen to us after we

continued. "It's supposed to tell a story and represent the guys who didn't come back." Names of all fallen military members from Lansing in our nation's wars were automatically included on the panels, and other names from across the country were added as loved ones made requests and donations.

Artist Jim McLaughlin donated his time to create the statue on the hill, which depicts the rescue of a wounded comrade.

A winding path leads to the POW/MIA Meditation Area where the symbolism continues—five spouts of water and five amber spotlights represent the five branches of service.

COMMUNITY EFFORT

Luberda, who serves as president of the Lansing Veterans Memorial Foundation, called the creation of the memorial a true community effort. "We had the Southeast Side Vietnam Veterans, American Legion in Calumet City, Navy Seabees, Iron Workers,

and Cub Scouts all working on it," he said. "There were old ladies out there digging ditches and boy scouts laying stone. It was built with sweat and tears and nickels and dimes."

THE HONOR GUARD

Early on, Luberda talked with another local Vietnam Veteran, Richard Dominiak of Calumet City, about creating an honor guard to conduct ceremonies at the memorial and within Lansing and surrounding communities. An honor guard was established in 1992 and marked a quarter-century of service this past March. Dominiak joined with Larry Grzywinski of Lansing, another Vietnam vet, and the two co-founded the Lansing Veterans Memorial Ceremonial Honor Guard. It began with eleven members and today continues with about 15 active members.

"That first year the honor guard marched in the Lansing Good Neighbor Parade for the first time and conducted its first Memorial Day and Veterans Day services at the memorial—and has been doing so ever since," said Grzywinski.

"We just celebrated 25 years as an organized honor guard," said Dominiak. "Besides things at the memorial, we help at community events like the 9/11 ceremony. We get calls for different events, and if I can put guys together, we'll do it, but it's getting harder."

Of those veterans who became part of the Lansing Veterans Memorial

Ceremonial Honor Guard 25 years ago, several have passed away, have moved out of the area, or are facing health issues that don't allow them to march in parades or stand at attention throughout long ceremonies. The honor guard hopes to attract some of the area's younger veterans to help carry on the traditions.

THE NEXT GENERATION

"We really need to get those from Desert Storm and Iraq and active

military in our honor guard and to join the American Legions," said LVMCHG member John Ulaszek. "We're losing a lot of people. We're losing the World War II and Korean and Vietnam Veterans. We need younger people to join our groups. We want them to stand up and be proud and show their colors."

Dominiak said the honor guard is open to anyone who ever served

in the U.S. Military. They need only to provide proof of their honorable discharge and purchase some uniform pieces. "We don't charge any dues. We get contributions from community organizations when we're asked to do something that we can't really afford to pay out of our own pockets. At one time L.A.C.E. (Lansing Association for Community Events) paid to replace the service flags that had taken a beating over the years."

The honor guard also likes to involve youths who may be inspired to one day join the military. Dominiak said that this year's Veterans Day Ceremony will include Lansing's Civil Air Patrol Squadron to carry out a 15 x 30' flag.

A WORK STILL IN PROGRESS

As much effort, thought, emotion and heart has been put into making the memorial what it is, it is far from complete, according to Luberd. "It's not really finished yet," he said. "It's still a work in progress. The hill is supposed to tell a story

and right now it's an incomplete sentence. We're missing some figures on the hill."

Luberd's original vision would also show a wounded soldier being lifted into the helicopter. He hopes to one day see three or four more statues added to complete the Vietnam-era scene. Lack of funding has slowed the progress. Although the labor for creating the first statue was donated, it still cost approximately \$40,000 to have the piece cast in bronze.

Ongoing maintenance of the memorial is also needed, and that requires both time and money. "It needs perpetual care, and we really could use a full-time landscaper," said Luberd, who does much of the work himself.



Honor Flight Chicago honors Lansing vets

Korean War veterans Bob Chambers and Rich Zaremba get a hero's welcome

LANSING, Ill. (October 11, 2017) - When the van pulled into the parking lot at Sunrise Health Foods on Torrence Avenue, Bob Chambers and Rich Zaremba didn't understand what was going on. The police were there along with a fire truck and a pack of motorcycles. It was around 10:30pm.

Chambers and Zaremba were returning from a day as guests of Honor Flight Chicago, a group founded in 2008 to recognize America's

senior war veterans by flying them to Washington, D.C., to tour the memorials built in their honor. The two Lansing residents had been up since 3:00am that morning, because they had to be at Midway Airport



around 4:00am. But even after a day of airports, flights, walking, and re-living memories

A transport van brought Bob Chambers and Rich Zaremba to Lansing, where the Legion Riders met them to escort them the rest of the way home.

and emotions, the adrenaline was keeping them energized.

"We're here to escort you home," explained one of the motorcycle men, Nick Grigutis, as he approached the van. Nick is President of the Legion Riders, and part of their mission is to escort area vets who return from an Honor Flight experience.

A DAY WITH HONOR FLIGHT

Information from the Honor Flight Chicago website explains:

"The one-day, all-expense paid trip is filled with appreciation, tributes, memories and gratitude.

"Many veterans form new bonds with one another during the day. Countless more confess their lives are rejuvenated afterward. It is only one day, but the experience can be life changing."

flight, Chambers called Zaremba, and the two men and their wives got together to introduce themselves. Both men had served in the Korean War, the "Forgotten War." And both had served in the Army. But it took Honor Flight to make the connection.

A HERO'S WELCOME

From the Sunrise parking lot, police cars, fire trucks, and motorcycles escorted the white van through the streets of Lansing to their homes. Lights, sirens, and horns made the neighbors wonder what in the world was happening, but any annoyance dissipated when they realized the commotion was a celebration of two heroes returning home.

This was the last flight of Honor Flight Chicago's season, which typically runs seven flights between April and October. Each flight carries approximately 100 veterans, and this year a source says each of these flights included a Lansing vet, though this information has not yet been confirmed by Honor Flight Chicago.

GETTING INVOLVED

There are a number of ways to get involved with Honor Flight Chicago—as a veteran, a volunteer, or a guardian. These opportunities are described at www.honorflightchicago.org/how-to-apply/

Veterans who want to apply often wonder if health conditions will prevent them from experiencing any aspect of the day. "The answer is no," says Honor Flight Chicago. "This day is for them, and HFC works with veterans and their families to ensure their comfort and safety."

Because of their age, World War II veterans are given priority, but there is now room for Korean War vets as well. The website also includes an application for Vietnam War veterans, with an explanation that they are not able to fly at this time, but submitting the application will reserve their place in line when openings do become available.

Chambers and Zaremba had never met each other before Honor Flight, though they are separated by only a couple miles on the north end of Lansing. In the weeks leading up to their scheduled

Wall of Honor brings together past and present, school and community

LANSING, Ill. (October 2017) - On May 27, 2017, TF South's new Wall of Honor was officially dedicated. The wall serves as a memorial to TF South alumni who served in the military after graduating. Currently displaying over 500 names, the Wall of Honor has been a joint effort amongst teachers, students, and the Lansing community.

Chris Roberts, TF South's Social Studies teacher and sponsor of The History Club and Mock Trial, has been directly involved with the wall, beginning with its conception four years ago.

HONORING THE PAST

"We were talking about a way to kind of remember at least the veterans who served from South," Roberts said. "We had previous plaques that were here for them, but we wanted something that unified all of them, so we decided to go with kind of a new wall that would have a cohesiveness between all the different memorials."

The Wall of Honor, which is displayed in the school's front lobby, currently has 10 plaques honoring veterans from each branch of the military, as well as individual plaques for those who were killed in action.

INSPIRING THE FUTURE

While the main goal of the wall is to honor TF South alumni veterans, Roberts also hopes the wall can serve as a learning tool for students. The wall allows current pupils to learn about past TF South students and the sacrifices they made. Roberts wants his students to remember the men and women who served the country and discuss the subject with their peers. Because the Wall of Honor is a permanent fixture of the school, the learning will continue with future students.

SERVICE

In fact, students have been directly involved with the project since day one. La-Wedia Washington, a senior at TF South, has been a member of The History Club since her freshman year. Since then, she

has helped find more names to add to the Wall of Honor.

"We've been going around Lansing asking different people, like the American Legion, to help us find people who graduated from TF South that went into the military," Washington said. Washington has personal connections to the military as well. She said it is important to recognize those who have protected our country.

PRIDE

Roberts hopes that students who assisted with the project feel some pride in their efforts. "Hopefully it's something that the students can be proud of in the future," he said. "The ones that participated in the project, and hopefully the students that

eventually will be on that wall."

CONNECTION

The wall, which just added a new plaque with 25 Army veterans, continues to grow.

Members of the community are encouraged to visit the wall during school hours. All guests entering the school will need to stop at the front desk to sign in first.

"Hopefully, as a community, we can build more also," Roberts said. "This is just another step to connecting the community with the school."







One Trick Pony creates craft beer oasis off the beaten path

Lansing's only tap room continues to grow

LANSING, Ill. (October 2017) - It started as a one-year experiment.

"What's the least amount of money you can spend to open a standalone brewery to see if you can keep it open for one year as an experiment?" That's what Mark Kocol asked himself a few years ago. He decided he'd give it a go, and after a year he would see where he was at. He opened One Trick Pony in 2012.

To say the experiment was successful is an understatement.

RUNNING OUT OF ROOM

One Trick Pony has since grown from a small tap room with a handful of tables and six taps to a new location a few doors down with increased space for brewing, more tables, a stage area, and 20 of their own beers on tap. And even in the new digs, One Trick Pony is bursting at the seams and considering yet another move.

"It's five years later, and I've learned lots," Kocol said. "We moved from our original spot down here to take over two spaces, and as you see when you look in the brewery, we are completely out of room. I'm kind of keeping my eyes open for a new space where I wouldn't have to ever move again."

Business has been good in Lansing and Kocol intends to stay here, looking for a larger spot that would have room to expand if needed. He also recognizes the need to bring more food options into the mix, which is currently limited to pizza, although customers are welcome to bring in their own food. At the time he opened, tap rooms that served strictly brews were the norm, but the industry has shifted with many becoming brewpubs with trendy menus of bar bites and seasonal


entrees. Because space an issue, he's toying with the idea of a food truck of his own. "The food truck industry has outgrown even brewing over the last five years," he said.

BIG DEMAND FOR BARREL-AGED BREWS

There have been other changes in the brewing world in those five short years, one of them being the popularity of barrel-aged beers. As we move into the season of heavier beers, Kocol plans to bring back a couple of stouts that did particularly well. Cocoa Butter Kisses, a spiced imperial stout sold out in about two hours when it was released last February. Heavy Things, a Russian imperial stout will return around St. Patrick's Day. "When it came out we did about a week and a half of sales in three hours," said Kocol.

Barrel-aged beers spend a significantly longer time aging than other varieties. Whereas a standard ale can go from grain to glass in a couple of weeks, Kocol said that a barrel-aged beer needs a good six months minimum to mature, often much longer. That translates into a much higher percentage of Alcohol by Volume (Or "ABV"). Standard beers typically are around 4, 5, or 6% ABV and some of One Trick Pony's barrel-aged versions have gone upwards of 12%. "We have Heavy Things in the tank right now sitting at 17 percent," said Kocol.

As the beers age in barrels rather than stainless steel, they can take on a number of flavor characteristics based on the wood and what was previously in the barrel. "They are brewed like normal beers, but are bigger, bolder, and higher in alcohol content and will mellow out while aging in the barrel. The

flavors tend to meld together," he said. "We try to be unique and experiment with styles you don't normally see." One of those unusual flavors would be a highly-anticipated seasonal stout that uses squash.

You'll have an opportunity to try

two new barrel-aged brews this month. Kentucky Mountain Barrel-Aged Ale will be available November 18 and a very special seasonal beer called CG Watershed will launch on November 4.

"CG Watershed is an American-style Imperial Spiced Porter, 12.5% ABV and released on tap and in bottles starting at 4 p.m. on November 4th," said Kocol. "It is brewed with locally-grown, cinnamon-baked acorn squash. No, it's not a lousy pumpkin beer! This is meant to showcase a traditional ingredient native to this area—North and Central America, to be exact—an area abounding in Indian trails used for settlement and trade, the same Native Americans who introduced the acorn squash to European settlers years ago."

GETTING STARTED

The name for the craft brewery came about when Kocol was home brewing and getting repeated requests from a friend who favored India Pale Ales. Kocol responded by telling him that he wasn't going to be his "One Trick Pony" and brew him IPAs all the time.

David Murphy played a vital role in helping to get One Trick Pony off the ground. "He was eminently



Professionally, Smith is Chief of Staff for State Representative Marcus Evans, so she is profoundly familiar with state and county government. The Park Board is eager to learn from her experience and connections.

And Smith is eager to add her energy to what she sees the team already doing. She helped with the Haunted Hallway event at Eisenhower Fitness Center this past Saturday and was impressed with the quality of the production and the dedication of staff who invested extra hours to make sure families had a good time. She hopes to maximize the program by looking at the numbers and asking some thoughtful questions about costs and returns.

Smith appreciates the variety of programs and amenities available through the Lan-Oak Park District, she wants to encourage more Lansing residents to take advantage of them and get involved. She has made it a personal mission to find new ways to communicate and educate, so more people can learn about everything Lan-Oak Park District offers.

“We have everything here!” she says. “Why go to another park in another village? Start using Lansing—we have the same things, and your tax dollars are already paying for them! People need to know what’s here.”

Education and engagement—those are the two words Smith uses to summarize what she hopes to accomplish as a Park Board Commissioner. “I’m proud of Lansing,” she says, “and I believe other people are too. If you want to know how to get involved and make a difference, come talk to me.”

important in setting the brewery taproom's early feel with his quick, corny jokes, engagement with customers, and effusiveness about how damn good our beer is," said Kocol. The brewery now has a staff of six with a full-time brewer, Jonathan Hickey.

GROWLERS TO CROWLERS

Over the years customers have come in not just to enjoy a pint at the bar, but to purchase beer to transport home in 64-ounce dark glass jugs called growlers. One disadvantage of a growler is that its contents have to be enjoyed quickly, as the screw on caps hold freshness for only a few days.

While growlers can still be filled at One Trick Pony, the brewery has also introduced a crowler system in which customers can select a beer and see it filled and canned before their eyes into 32-ounce containers.

Kocol expects to have pre-canned beer available for sale before the holidays.

ADDING ENTERTAINMENT

Last year open mic nights debuted with Ed Hill, and Kocol said that feature has been drawing in new people from all over on Wednesday nights. "You don't need to call in advance. Just show up with instruments," he said. "We encourage anyone that plays to get up there, and I really like the creativity. We had one girl come in with horrible stage fright and you could tell every bit of her rehearsal went out the window. But a couple guys went up and started playing behind her—and she knocked everyone dead."

Open mic nights were so well-received that a permanent stage area was added, and a back room was opened up to extend seating. Bands are featured on the weekends—a mixture of local, touring, and cover bands. One Thursday a month, Paul's Broken Radio, a local blues band, performs. There's no cover charge for bands.

WHERE AND WHEN

One Trick Pony Brewery is located at 17845-17851 Chappel Avenue and is open seven nights a week until 10:00 or 11:00pm.
